

# GLOBAL NUTRITION INVESTMENT FRAMEWORK: PRIORITY ACTIONS



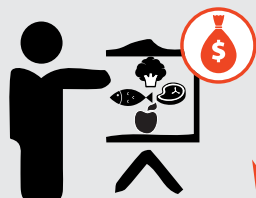
To catalyze progress against malnutrition, priority should be given to a set of the **most cost-effective actions**, all of which can be scaled up immediately



Financing needed 2016-2025:

**\$2.2 billion per year**  
in addition to current spending

- ▶ **Donors** provide on average an **additional \$650 million** per year over baseline spending
- ▶ Country governments provide on average an **additional \$1.4 billion per year** over baseline spending



## Projected Impact of Investment

- ▶ **2.2 million lives saved**
- ▶ **50 million fewer stunted children**  
in 2025 as compared to 2015

## PRIORITY PACKAGE OF INTERVENTIONS FOR URGENT SCALE UP

- ✓ Vitamin A supplementation for children
- ✓ Promotion of good infant and young child nutrition and hygiene practices
- ✓ Antenatal micronutrient supplementation
- ✓ Intermittent preventive treatment of malaria for pregnant women
- ✓ Iron and folic acid supplements for adolescent girls
- ✓ Staple food fortification
- ✓ Pro-breastfeeding social policies
- ✓ National breastfeeding promotion campaign
- ✓ Treatment of severe acute malnutrition

The impact also includes reductions due to anticipated progress in food availability and diversity, women's health and education, and ambitious investments in water and sanitation.

\$2.2 billion per year in addition to current spending excludes financing for IPTp (antimalarial medicine provided during regular prenatal visits), of which \$0.5 billion is covered by other health initiatives, including the President's Malaria Initiative, The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, TB, and Malaria, and to some extent national governments.
